Birch Class Update


Birch class have spent the past half term exploring the topic 'Movers and Shakers'. During this project, the children have been exploring the lives of influential historical figures, how they changed the world and what motivated them.

In English, we have been reading the text 'Rosa Parks: Little People, Big Dreams'. In class discussions, the children thought about how they would have felt growing up as Rosa Parks. It has been great to see so much enthusiasm for this topic, with many children sharing very thoughtful ideas and creative responses to Rosa's story. The class then used this as inspiration for writing, producing diary entries from the perspective of Rosa Parks. These diary entries demonstrated how well we can consider the feelings of others and how far our writing has come already this year!

Meanwhile, in Project lessons, Birch class have delved into the life of Emily Davison. The children learnt why the Suffragettes were so outraged and understood that they needed to take to the streets to protest! We even staged our own Suffragette protest in class, showcasing our placards made with short, snappy slogans to spread the Suffragette message.

Throughout this topic, there have been some fantastic discussions in class around what makes rules fair and what it means to stand up for what is right. Next, the children will be considering what it means for events to be 'significant' and comparing the achievements of several influential people.

Forest School Fun: Last week, Birch class also took part in Muddy Maths! This is a wonderful opportunity for the children to consolidate their understanding of abstract ideas using natural materials. We had a busy morning practising multiplication by building equal groups and persevering through some challenging concepts. Well done Birch Class!







Willow Class Update

Willow class have been continuing to develop our green fingers as part of our 'Sow, Grow and Farm' topic this term and have been carefully weeding and tending to our raised bed at the back of school. We have already planted some 'mystery bulbs' in the ground and have some very healthy-looking plants growing in the classroom ready to move outside when it's not so cold. (Green) fingers crossed we might have some vegetables and herbs to take home with us at Easter!

In Science this term our topic is 'properties of materials' and last week we undertook an experiment to see which material could keep our drinks warmest for longest by testing their thermal insulation. We added hot water to glass, ceramic, card and plastic cups and measured their temperature every two minutes to see which cup of water lost its heat the fastest. We have been testing a variety of materials to decide their suitability for different uses at a music festival.



In Art, we have learned about the Japanese artist Yayoi Kusama and her vibrant dotty paintings and sculptures. Yayoi Kusama had hallucinations as a child in which she saw everything turn into dots which greatly influenced her work. We have started to cover balloons in paper mache in preparation to make our own versions of her famous spotty pumpkin, but we think we might end up with spotty melons instead!



Football Champions!

Mr Butler and 10 excited Year 5&6 girls enjoyed a blustery Tuesday afternoon in Cambourne as they left school to attend a football tournament. The girls, with their shared a commitment to football training at the Glebe this year, competed against 15 other Cambridge teams and walked away with the top award, beating their closest rivals on goal difference! Mr Butler and Mr Bull are very proud of the team, not just for the commitment they have shown to win the tournament, but how they represented the school with the positive and happy attitude throughout all of their games.

IB Update



This week, we looked at the IB Learner Profiles during a whole-school assembly. The Learner Profile describes a broad range of characteristics and responsibilities that go beyond academic success. Through developing these traits, our children will learn to respect themselves, others and the world around them.

As a school, we watched a video introducing the learner profile before comparing and linking these attributes to our 6 existing core values. The children engaged in discussion with their peers to think about which of our core values align with the learner profile characteristics.





















It was lovely to see the children make these links and be able to explain so enthusiastically why they link together. For example, we linked the learner profile of 'thinker' to our core value of curiosity, responsibility and perseverance. We also had fun thinking about ourselves and which of the learner profile characteristics we already exhibit!




