Year 6 Trip



Oak recently visited the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology to take part in a fascinating workshop all about the Ancient Maya.

We learned how archaeologists have built up their understanding of Mayan civilisation and used these skills to study a plaster cast of a real Mayan stela depicting a mighty king. We then had the exciting opportunity to handle genuine artefacts—some over 1,000 years old—and worked together to infer what they may have been used for and what they can tell us about life in the past.

The workshop was a fantastic hands-on experience that really brought our history learning to life.



Year 3 Bike Ability

Year 3 recently took part in Bikeability training and had a fantastic time, even braving the cold weather with big smiles and plenty of enthusiasm!

Through fun, progressive games, the children developed greater control of their bikes in preparation for road cycling. They confidently pedalled independently, practised using their brakes to stop smoothly and quickly, and learned how to look behind over each shoulder while riding in a straight line. The children also challenged themselves by pedalling one-handed to signal, using gears where available, and safely avoiding hazards.

Despite the chilly conditions, their determination and enjoyment shone through, making the course a great success.



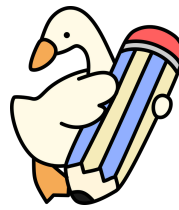
School Uniform Reminder

A reminder of School Uniform Requirements:

- Royal blue sweatshirt, cardigan or fleece with or without the school logo.
- White polo shirt or shirt with or without the school logo.

- Blue and white summer dress.
- Plain grey, black, navy or white socks or tights.

NSPCC Speak Out Stay Safe



Earlier this term, Mrs Fitch wrote to inform you that our school is taking part in the NSPCC's 'Speak Out. Stay Safe' programme.

Next week, children will watch an age-appropriate assembly in their classroom with their class teacher. The following week, pupils in Year 2, Year 5 and Year 6 will also take part in workshops delivered by trained NSPCC volunteers. The sessions are designed to be engaging, interactive and appropriate for each age group.

The Speak Out Stay Safe programme aims to help children understand abuse in all its forms and to recognise the signs of abuse.

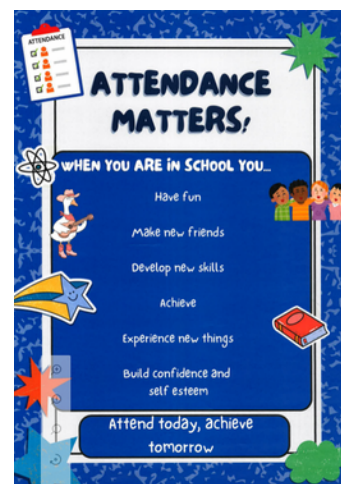
www.kooth.com - 24/7 access to text-based counselling – for ages ten and above

Key features of Kooth:

- **Anonymous & Free:** Users can access support without revealing their identity, and it is fully funded in many areas, often through the NHS.
- **Professional Counselling:** Text-based chats with qualified counsellors and emotional wellbeing practitioners, available at specific times (e.g., afternoons/evenings).
- **Peer Support:** Moderated forums where young people can connect and share experiences with others.
- **Self-Help Tools:** Articles, activities, journaling, and mood-tracking resources to build emotional resilience.
- **Accessibility:** Available on computers, tablets, and smartphones, making support easily accessible.
- **Early Intervention:** Works with local services to prevent crises and offer timely support to young people struggling with their mental health.

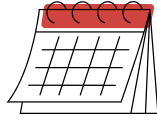

HOW TO GET HERE...



The easiest way to get to the Cledara Abbey Stadium is via the Park and Ride. It costs £3.50 to get a return bus ticket from the Newmarket Road Park & Ride, which is located at CB5 8AA. After sorting your ticket/s and checking out the Kids' Zone, head for the Mead Family South Stand turnstiles, which can be found via the path which goes through Coldham's Common. If you have any queries on the day, please talk to our 'Abbey Helpers', who are dotted around the ground ready to take your questions and be of assistance.

JUNIOR U'S KIDS' ZONE...

Once you have arrived at the Cledara Abbey, why not stop off at the Kids' Zone, which is located just outside of the Club Shop. Open from 1pm-2:45pm at every Saturday home Matchday, it features an inflatable goal, games such as Giant Connect 4, Table Football and Subsoccer, and you may even see an appearance from our First Team players!
